Common Entrance... Now a thing of the past

Whenever the history of Education in St. Vincent and the Grenadines is written, the year 2014 will surface as the year when the Ministry of Education presented the first cohort of students for the Caribbean Primary Exit Assessment (CPEA). The Common Entrance examination, which served for several decades, is now defunct.

Close to 2000 grade six students sat the first-ever CPEA final exam. This year, 1948 students registered for the exit exam - 917 girls and 1031 boys. This compares to last year's figure of 2314 students, 1210 females and 1104 males. The CPEA final exam took place on Friday 16th May and was conducted at 17 centres across the country.

The students sat 3 multiple-choice papers in Mathematics, Language Arts and Science. Prior to the final exam, they completed their School-Based Assessments (internal component) and the scores and samples of their work were sent to the Caribbean Examinations Council (CXC). The internal component accounts for 40 % of each student's overall score, while the final exam comprises 60% of the student's final score.

The 2014 CPEA was administered and will be graded by CXC. The Ministry of Education now continues its on-going training in the implementation of the CPEA for 2015 and beyond.

The Glows of Technology in SVG

Near 15 000 net-books were distributed to students in primary schools, as well as first formers in secondary schools, under the "One laptop per Child" programme in 2011. Three (3) years later, the programme continues with over 12 000 laptops being made available to students in secondary schools, as well as those enrolled at the St. Vincent and the Grenadines Community College.



The "One Laptop per Student" programme involves the distribution of 12 500 ACER (11.6" Screen-Travel Mate B11-E) laptops and is an initiative of Prime Minister

Dr. Ralph Gonsalves. Mrs. Flex Dennis, chairman of Dennis Publishing, is also credited for her invaluable support of the "One Laptop per Student" project. She lives on the Grenadine island of Mustique.

The "One laptop per Child" project is believed to have brought a new sense of technological awareness in the country, with much emphasis on the integration of ICT in education. Following closely on the heels of that project, the "One Laptop per Student" programme is expected to bear similar fruits.

The following are some of the objectives of the "One Laptop per Student" programme:

- 1. To continue to improve the digital literacy among all students and teachers
- 2. To continue enhancing the learning environment with technology
- 3. To continue improving the level of student-preparation for the digital workplace
- 4. To continue to reduce inequality of access to digital technology between students of lower and upper social classes in St Vincent and the Grenadines



Mrs. Channyatt Ramsamooj, Education Officer responsible for Information Technology (IT) in the Ministry of Education is heading a team to put the necessary arrangements in place. This includes proper inventory, testing and distribution of the machines.

Mrs. Ramsamooj says: "Parents, students and teachers, you are urged to appreciate these educational tools, take full advantage of them and importantly, care them. They are useful to the educational growth of our country". According to Ramsamooj, a series of workshops will be organized to assist teachers in improving their own technological literacies, in addition to integrating the technological tools into their classroom instruction.

The Ministry of Education continues to facilitate professional development sessions to equip teachers with the skills and competencies related to teaching and learning in this digital age.

The EZLearners one-day workshop presented applications for use in the instruction of English Language and Mathematics. These applications included learning activities to help students develop skills in writing, comprehension, reading, mathematical reasoning and critical thinking.

The Adult & Continuing Education division in the Ministry of Education will also be integral to the adaptation process. The unit is expected to provide training support for parents on how to use the tool effectively so that they can also assist, monitor and guide their children at home.

The laptops are scheduled to arrive in St Vincent and the Grenadines in May/June, 2014. Below are a few students' thoughts on the "One Laptop per Student" initiative:


Yes, I have heard about it on the TV in a release from the government and read about it in news articles...







ST. VINCENT GIRLS' HIGH SCHOOL

The St. Vincent Girls' High School was opened in 1911 by Miss Mary I. Ince at a location near to the Victoria Park. Back then, it was a private institution exclusively for girls of the upper class.

In 1914, the government undertook responsibility for the school and it was relocated to the corner of Linley and Tyrell streets. This change in ownership gave girls of all socio-economic backgrounds access to attend the school. In 1935, the school moved to its present location at Richmond Hill, Kingstown. It is adjacent to the St. Vincent Grammar School.

Since its inception in the early 20th century, the Girls' High School (GHS) has grown in many ways. The institution has seen a rise in population from just a few girls, to a current enrollment of over eight hundred (800) students. The school caters for girls between the ages of eleven (11) and sixteen (16) years and is today considered one of the top secondary schools. The records show that it is the most sort after all-girls secondary school with an outstanding record close to 100% pass rate in the CXC CSEC exams over the last 10 years.

GHS continues to progress with a dedicated staff and under the astute leadership of Mrs. Andrea Bowman. Mrs. Bowman assumed duties as Headmistress in 2004. She is the daughter or Mrs. Norma Keizer, the longest serving Headmistress the instituiton has seen (1975-1990).

The physical plant consists of five (5) buildings where classes are conducted, a multi-purpose court and three (3) tuck shops.

The Importance of Music Education Inderscored

The Ministry of Education has handed over a collection of recorders to a school with a promising Music programme.



The Dr. J.P Eustace Memorial Secondary School received 35 recorders on Wednesday 21st May. The instruments are intended to adequately position the current batch of 3rd form students to take Music at the CXC CSEC level in 2016. The recorders were handed over by Education Officer for Music, Dexter Bacchus, who is assisting with the strengthening of the Music programme at the institution.

The Caribbean Examinations Council (CXC) has been offering music education for more than a decade. Research suggests that students who study Music are likely to be high achievers and well-rounded, perhaps because music does the following:

- Develops areas of the brain involved in language and reasoning, so students are better able to think creatively and solve problems
- Enhances team work skills and discipline
- Teaches the value of sustained effort to achieve excellence

- Teaches young people to conquer fear and to take risks
- Provides a means of self-expression and increases self-confidence
- Focuses on doing rather than observing, leading to multi-dimensional young people with flexible intellects, thus preparing them for the world of work
